Gospel Luke 24:13-35

The gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke chapter twenty four beginning at the thirteenth verse.

Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Now on that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, but their eyes were kept from recognizing him. And he said to them, 'What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?' They stood still, looking sad. Then one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answered him, 'Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have taken place there in these days?' He asked them, 'What things?' They replied, 'The things about Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, and how our chief priests and leaders handed him over to be condemned to death and crucified him. But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things took place. Moreover, some women of our group astounded us. They were at the tomb early this morning, and when they did not find his body there, they came back and told us that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who said that he was alive. Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said; but they did not see him.' Then he said to them, 'Oh, how foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have declared! Was it not necessary that the Messiah should suffer these things and then enter into his glory?' Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them the things about himself in all the scriptures. As they came near the village to which they were going, he walked ahead as if he were going on. But they urged him strongly, saying, 'Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over.' So he went in to stay with them. When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him; and he vanished from their sight. They said to each other, 'Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?' That same hour they got up and returned to Jerusalem; and they found the eleven and their companions gathered together. They were saying, 'The Lord has risen indeed, and he has appeared to Simon!' Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread.

REFLECTIONS ON READINGS

God's life and grace, and the gift of resurrection, are wonderful things to know about, but they mean very little in real terms without a response from us. While God's grace and love are always available, it is as we respond that we are able to appropriate and benefit from them. The power of Peter's sermon was only realised by his hearers when they responded to what he had said. The psalmist recognises that God's gracious rescue is made real when he responds with gratitude, praise and commitment. Peter invites the believers who have come to faith in Christ and received God's life to respond by living lives of love toward one another, which of course, is how God's life is experienced. Finally, the two disciples on the Emmaus Road have heard about Jesus' resurrection, but it is only when they recognise him at the meal as he breaks bread that the reality of the resurrection hits home to them and they experience it for themselves. It is not that God needs our response in order to love us, forgive us, or save us, but that for us to know, experience and live out of the life and grace of God, we need to appropriate what God has given us and respond to the realities that we encounter. This call for response is a powerful and hopeful part of the Gospel we preach, and is the gift we are invited to share in worship this week.

I prayed that God would grant us both peaceful hearts and a fresh start." "That's not what I prayed," said Sven. "I asked God to help me put up with you."

How did Jesus' crucifixion save us? It's 'cause he nailed it!

FR GARY'S SERMON

Well, I think we've all enjoy a walk along the beach now and then. And from the walks I've done over the years, I've managed to collect a few things along the way. (*show the coral*) Like these pieces of coral and (*show the lime stone*) and this interesting-shaped lime stone rock.

But as interesting as these thing are, or anything else we might happen to find on a beach walk, they can never compare to the amazing find of the two disciples on their walk to Emmaus in today's gospel reading For this was a walk during which they found the risen Jesus, though they hadn't realized it.

These two disciples might have been a man and a woman. A masculine noun is used in the Greek, but the word could refer to a couple. And since they shared a home, there is speculation that it was Cleopas and his wife.

Emmaus was west of Jerusalem. So the disciples were walking towards a setting sun. They were walking into the night physically as well as spiritually, So when they met a stranger along the way, they told him that Jesus of Nazareth, whom they had expected to deliver Israel from its present occupation by Roman troops and bring in the kingdom of God, is dead! Rumours had reached them that the tomb was empty. Jesus, however, had not been seen. And we can hear the disappointment in their words when they said, "We had hoped that he was the one..." But everything became clear to them when the stranger, using his knowledge of the scriptures, explained the meaning of all the things that had just happened.

Towards the end of our gospel reading, the disciples said to each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?"

But even though Jesus had caused the disciples hearts to burn within them, he still didn't force himself on them; he waited for their invitation. God has given everyone the gift of free-will; we can use it to invite Christ into our lives or to allow him to pass on.

And in this case, the disciples invited Jesus into their lives without even knowing it, because the stranger doesn't disclose himself as Jesus until he goes into their home, where he sat at the table with them, took some bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them.

And when the disciples recognize Jesus in joyous disbelief, he vanishes out of sight.

So what can we learn from this immortal story?

First, many of us rejoice in good news but are often reluctant to share it. We've probably all heard the popular religious slogan, "Keep the Faith," which is a really good thing to do, but Christians should be encouraged, and sent forth to "Share our Faith," as well.

Faith is meant to be shared. But obviously, we can't share something that's foreign to us. And I've heard it said, "There are two things a person cannot do. You cannot tell someone something you don't know. And you cannot lead someone where you are not going." To share the faith means we translate belief in Jesus into concern and action. We will always treasure what we read in the scriptures.

But we're also compelled to share the meaning of what we read in the scriptures.

And I've experienced no greater joy in my 33 years of ministry than to see men and women discover the loving presence of Christ and translate that presence into compassionate ministry, which finds expression in significant, loving service.

A second lesson we can learn from the Emmaus story is the way Jesus reveals himself to us in simple ordinary acts. It is a staggering revelation to learn that these two disciples were not in the Upper Room. They were not among the twelve apostles.

But obviously, they had been present in some setting with Jesus during his ministry, and now he is present in their home in Emmaus. Jesus had come into their home at their invitation. They share an ordinary meal in an ordinary Jewish home, with an ordinary loaf of bread. In this act, as Jesus breaks the bread, these two disciples recognize him.

What a lesson!

We believe Christ is present at the Eucharist. And he is also present at the table in our own homes.

So when it's all said and done, this story speaks to us about the gift of hospitality.

These disciples might never have recognized Jesus had they not invited him into their home!

I wonder, do we ever hesitate to invite Jesus into certain parts of our lives?

If our answer to that question is yes, we can be assured that Jesus, who doesn't force himself on anyone, is always waiting for an invitation.
